**Revenue Purpose Statement for both  
Odebolt-Arthur Community School District &  
Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School District**

**Statement Vote February 5th, 2013  
Vote Defines School Improvement Sales Tax Use**

When you go to the polls to vote in February, there will be two items on the ballot for your consideration in Battle Creek-Ida Grove and one item on the ballot for Odebolt-Arthur. The board of education from both districts will submit for your approval their plans to use funds from the newly authorized statewide school infrastructure one-cent sales tax. In addition, there is a school board seat up for election in BCIG. The seat was originally held by Dr. Luft and has been filled by appointment with Jill Godbersen since September.

Since the state tax replaces the old, local one-cent sales tax, the school districts must re-state how we intend to use the funds, and the community must vote on that "revenue purpose statement." Here are some things to consider:

- The statewide sales tax was signed into law by the governor in April, 2008.
- This is not a vote to determine whether the tax will go into effect.
- The tax will be charged by the state regardless of the outcome of this vote.
- The school district cannot use the funds to build or renovate buildings without passing a purpose statement.
- This is a vote to allow the school board to access the funds and use them as they propose in their purpose statement – and only as proposed.
- Passage of this statement would make it possible to continue to maintain the facilities in each respective district.
- Failure to pass a purpose statement for the sales tax will delay planned facility projects for the district.
- The district has been a responsible steward of the local-option sales tax funds, using the monies numerous district-wide maintenance projects.

With the sales tax funds, the district could address the facility issues that are currently critical, and it may be able to work toward other projects such as improving and expanding activity facilities or upgrading support services facilities and buildings.

A SUMMARY OF THE ACTUAL "REVENUE PURPOSE STATEMENT," WHICH WILL READ AS FOLLOWS:

*Money received by the 'Odebolt-Arthur School District' or 'Battle Creek-Ida Grove School District' (depending on the voting location) from the State of Iowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund may be spent for any one of more of the following purposes:*

TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

To provide funds to build and furnish a new school building or buildings; to build and furnish addition(s) to school buildings in the district; to remodel, repair, expand, and improve the school buildings in the district; to purchase and improve grounds; for demolition work; to furnish and equip district facilities.

To provide funds for the purchase, lease or lease-purchase of buildings or equipment (including transportation, technology and recreation equipment) as authorized by law, to implement energy conservation measures, sharing or rental of facilities, procuring or acquisition of libraries, or opening roads to schoolhouses or buildings.

To provide funds for emergency repairs to respond to natural disasters, such as fire, wind damage, flood; unanticipated mechanical, plumbing, structural, roof, electrical system failures; environmental remediation; or to respond to changes in demographics that require construction of additions or improvements to school buildings or new school buildings.

To provide funds to establish and maintain public recreation places and playgrounds; provide for supervision and instruction for recreational activities; or for community education purposes; and other authorized expenditures and purposes as now or hereafter permitted by law and designated by the 'Odebolt-Arthur School District' or 'Battle Creek-Ida Grove School District' (depending on the voting location).

To provide funds for the payment of principal and interest or retirement of general obligation bonds issued for school infrastructure purposes, energy improvement loans, loan agreements authorized by Iowa Code section 297.36, sales, service and use tax revenue bonds issued under Iowa Code section 423E.5.

If this proposition should fail to be approved by the voters, such failure shall not be construed to terminate or restrict authority previously granted by the voters to expend receipts from the Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund.

If approved, this Revenue Purpose Statement shall remain in effect until replaced or amended by the 'Odebolt-Arthur School District' or 'Battle Creek-Ida Grove School District' (depending on the voting location).

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

*Q: The wording of the purpose statement seems broad. Why not tighten it down and list specific projects you intend to use the money for?*

*A: The district will be able to use the sales tax for the next 16 years. No one can accurately predict what changes may occur in either district over that time. Who can say what issues the boards of education may face? The statement language gives future boards flexibility to adjust plans to the community's changing needs. If we specify individual projects, the board would then be bound to execute those projects - even if future events dictate they no longer are the right projects for the communities.*

*Q: Even with the sales tax, won't property taxes still go up if you need a bond issue in the future?*

*A: Not necessarily. The district can borrow against the incoming sales tax funds and use that money to pay off the debt. Essentially, this would replace the property tax component of some future bond issues with the sales tax. This gives the community the best possible opportunity for tax relief. Please note, however, that the sales tax may not meet every need.*

*Q: Have we considered how other school districts are wording their purpose statements?*

*A: Yes. In fact, this purpose statement is based on an example recommended by our Attorney. They counsel other districts as well. They believe this statement, while providing good direction, allows the district latitude to meet the needs of a changing community.*

### *IOWA ASSESSMENT TESTING*

As we look ahead toward February we have been preparing as a staff to help our students be successful during their Iowa Assessment Testing, February 4th – 15th. Listed below are some tips for testing that you can look over with your students to help them become prepared to do their best!

1. Mark down test days on your calendar so you and your child are both aware of testing dates.
2. Encourage your student to stay confident and calm.
3. Keep a positive attitude about tests.
4. Talking about the test with your child can relieve stress about test taking.
5. Be sure to get a good night sleep.
6. Make sure that your child gets up early enough so that he/she will be on time to school.
7. Ensure that your child eats a healthy breakfast and avoid heavy foods that may make him/her groggy and avoid high sugar foods that may make him/her hyper.
8. Remind them to READ each questions carefully and all answers before they commit to an answer and mark it on their sheet.
9. Encourage your student to take their time and ask questions if they are confused.
10. Encourage your child to do well but don't pressure him/her. You may stress him/her out. It is important for your child to stay relaxed for the test.

### *MRS. WUNSCHER'S THIRD GRADE CLASSROOM*

### *NURSING NOTES - ANGIE KASTNER, SCHOOL NURSE*

#### **RISE IN PERTUSSIS ILLNESS LEADS TO CHANGE IN SCHOOL IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS**

During 2012, a large increase in the number of cases of pertussis (whooping cough) was reported in Iowa. More than 1450 persons were diagnosed with pertussis- a 425% increase from the state average in the previous 5 years. The highest rate of illness was in children ages 10 to 14. Studies show that protection from pertussis received through vaccinations given to infants and preschoolers diminishes in 5 to 10 years and results in a higher rate of infection among adolescents. For this reason, the Iowa Administrative Code will change to require a dose of Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis) for students entering Grade 7 in the 2013-2014 school year. The additional booster dose of Pertussis Vaccine will protect children at the age where they are most at risk for the illness.

To make it easier for parents to comply with the new vaccination requirement, the Iowa Department of Public Health will provide Tdap vaccine for local county public health agencies to administer to adolescents at school based clinics. The Public Health Departments from Sac and Ida Counties have offered to work with our school district to provide Tdap vaccinations for students in grades 6 through 12. The clinics will be held at the Middle School and High School during the second semester of this school year. Questions about the vaccinations may be directed to Sac County Public Health (712-662-4785.) To meet the requirements of the state health department, students will be required to sign up for the vaccination prior to the clinics so that the correct number of doses can be ordered.

Please watch for more information and permission consents for the Tdap vaccination with your child's next report card. Consent will also be available on the school website and the middle and high school offices.

### *MR. MIESNER'S MEMO:*

The OA Elementary Physical education classes have been working hard all year long. Students have learned many different and valuable skills. A portion of the time has been devoted to jump rope. We are currently full stride in our jump rope unit. We will be culminating our unit with the Jump Rope For Heart event. The event will be held February 1st, in the OA gymnasium. # **CURRICULUM CLIPS**

## **NEAL UTESCH, CURRICULUM DIRECTOR**

### ***CURRICULUM UPDATE:***

Materials for math have arrived for teacher to review from Houghton Mifflin Harcourt and materials from Prentice Hall are on their way. Teachers have a chance to review the materials and decide what would be a best fit for our current standards, the Common Core standards, and what materials will help to push our students as they advance through the OA and BCIG school districts. When a decision is made, then we can look at possible purchases that will need to be made for math materials in the district.

### ***DISTRICT LEADERSHIP:***

The District Leadership team will meet on February 7th with two representatives from the Northwest Area Education Agency (NWAEA). Katy Evenson and Sherri Blake will work with the team to train them in the Iowa Core Alignment Tool (ICAT) process. This leadership team along with the building administrators will then implement the ICAT program during our next 1/ day professional development day on March 8th. During this training the teaching staff will take our current curriculum and using the ICAT program they will align our current standards and benchmarks with the new common core. In the end we will have a completed document that can outline our problem areas in curriculum and help us to better align the current standards and benchmarks that are in place with the new common core of Iowa.

### ***CAC COMMITTEE:***

CAC/SIAC committee was chosen and welcome letters sent to all new members of this committee were sent out with communication of our meeting schedule in place for the 2012-13 school year. We are currently scheduled to have our first meeting in February on the 12th. During this meeting, the group will work toward developing our goals for the present school year into the fall of 2013. These goals will drive the purpose of the SIAC team and give direction to the group on what may need to be addressed in the district. This group will work closely with the school board as they look to develop their committee goals.

### ***IOWA ASSESSMENTS:***

Iowa Assessments have been scheduled in the OA and BCIG school districts and will take place at the following times: OA Elementary and BCIG Elementary will take theirs the week of Feb. 4th – Feb. 15th, with plans for make up test to take place during the week of Feb. 18th – 22nd. OA-BCIG High School and OA-BCIG Middle School will take the Iowa Assessments/ITEDS January 28th – Feb. 8th. All testing will be completed by the end of February and sent into the state for evaluation. All students will take the full battery of test this year so that a base line data collection can be established on the new testing format for our students.

### ***ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:***

On March 17, 2013, administrators will travel to Sioux City to a site visit meeting to discuss some of the key accreditation topics to help our school prepare for this important event. As an administrative team we have been working to collect all the necessary artifacts needed for our visit and will begin to work on our overall presentations for the OA and BCIG school districts as well as develop a plan for the many interview teams that will participate in representing our districts during the visit. Look for more information on this in upcoming newsletters.

I have enrolled the OA and BCIG school districts for the Smarter Balance Assessment Trial that will take place this spring 2013. If selected the district will take a standardized assessment on-line that will help the state to collect data on a new tool they plan to utilize in the future. The district may be notified by the end of February if we have been selected.

What exactly is the Smarter Balance Assessment? Smarter Balanced is a state-led consortium developing assessments aligned to the Common Core State Standards in English language arts/literacy and mathematics that are designed to help prepare all students to graduate high school college- and career-ready. 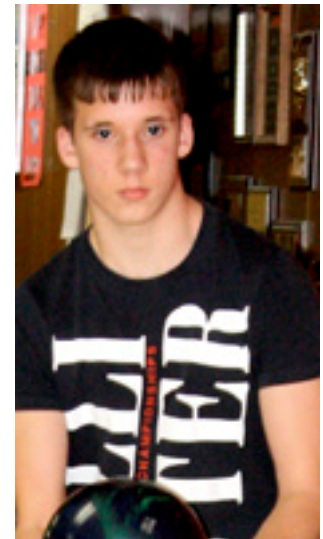



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### ACT WORKSHOP

Western Iowa Tech Community College is excited to extend an invitation to OA-BCIG juniors and sophomores to attend the Chad Cargill ACT Test Prep Session. The event will be held on the Western Iowa Tech Community College Campus February 13th from 12:30-4:00 in our Corporate College Conference Center B174.

The Chad Cargill workshop is a practical hands-on instruction session. Chad recently graduated from Oklahoma State with a degree in Industrial Engineering. While in high school, Chad took the ACT 18 times and raised his score from a 19 to a 32. This workshop is packed full of relevant, practical information on how to increase your ACT score as he did. It shows you that the ACT is beatable and that each test will ask you the same questions just worded differently. The workshop covers what will be on the test and how to master the techniques. The workshop is not a practice test. It covers general ideas about the ACT as a whole and the individual sections of English (including what the test-makers are looking for and the relevant English rules needed for the test), math (including exactly what formulas and rules you will need to answer virtually every question), reading (including three strategies on how to best take the reading comprehension section), and science (including common question types and strategies to understand and beat the science reasoning section).

The price for a student to attend this workshop is \$30.00. Students are also able to purchase an ACT Prep Book for \$20.00 and calculators programmed with math formulas for \$120 or \$150.

If a junior or sophomore would like to attend this workshop they must sign up in the high school guidance office by Wednesday, February 6th. Payment must be made when signing up. Students must provide transportation.
