OPEN ENROLLMENT

Iowa Open Enrollment law allows parents/guardians to enroll their child in a district other than their district of residence without paying tuition by completing a timely filed open enrollment application.

Open Enrollment applications are available from any Iowa School District, Area Education Agency or the State Department of Education. An application must be completed for each child and filed with the receiving school district.

Open Enrollment applications must be filed with the receiving district by March 1 of the school year preceding the school year for which open enrollment is requested. For example, an application must be filed by March 1, 2014, in order to be approved for the 2014/2015 school year. For Kindergarten students the deadline is September 1.

Exceptions to these deadlines are as follows:

- Students currently living in and attending an Iowa district, and whose family moves to another Iowa district, but the student wants to remain in the original district.
- Students who move into the district from out of state or for another reason considered to be good cause as listed in the open enrollment law, may have the deadline waived.

Once an application is approved, your child may continue in the receiving district until they graduate or you move from your resident district. You do not need to reapply each year.

High school students who transfer school districts through open enrollment have a 90 school day waiting period to participate in varsity athletic competition, although they may practice with the team during this time. However, the student may participate immediately in a varsity interscholastic sport if the student is entering grade nine for the first time and did not participate in an interscholastic competition for another school or school district during the summer immediately following 8th

If a parent/guardian meets income eligibility guidelines for transportation assistance, application for that assistance should be filed with the resident district. Transportation assistance is available only between contiguous districts. Income eligibility guidelines are available with the open enrollment application packet.

Can an Open Enrollment Application be denied? A request can be denied if the filing deadlines are not met, if the resident district has a diversity plan that would be adversely affected, if there is not classroom space available for the student or if the student is under suspension or expulsion from his/her current school district. Out of state residents are not eligible for open enrollment and would need to pay tuition to attend.

ROBOTICS BY SUSAN MAASS, INSTRUCTOR

The Robotics teams competed January 11th at Sergeant Bluff-Luton. The day began with check in at 7:30AM and ended with an award ceremony at 7:00PM. At the start of the day, the teams met with the judges to talk about their robots and their learning experiences along the way. Next, they had hardware and software inspections. The opening ceremonies began at 11:15 and was followed by 36 qualifying rounds in which each team competed 6 times with 6 different alliances against an opposing team.

Team 7620 (Panda Express) ended in 7th and Team 7109 (Nerd Herd) ended with an eleventh place finish out of 24 teams. Team 7109 was picked to be part of an alliance in the semifinals. Their alliance won one of the three semi-final rounds so they did not advance to the finals.

This is the first year for both these teams in FIRST Tech Challenge and they will compete again on February 1st in Lincoln, Nebraska.

SLEDS BY ROGER CHRISTENSEN, INSTRUCTOR

The Scientific Principles and Applications (SPA) classes have designed and constructed snow sleds made primarily from cardboard. The sleds traversed the hill at Moorehead Park for twenty meters during testing. Students could work individually or in small groups.

The sled was required to carry as many people as the number of people who worked on making the sled. There were also material and budget limits. The budget was one SPA dollar per person, and with this they had to shop for large yard waste garbage bags, glue, tape and twine.

Our purpose for this lab was varied. Design teams had to deal with inertia and friction's effects on motion. Speed was calculated based on the testing of designs as well as acceleration, momentum and force in relationship to the sled runs.

Students also continued to learn about design, construction of prototypes, material restrictions and the scientific method.

The lab format was one the students have used several times before and one that develops problem-solving skills in a six-step process.

STEP ONE: DEFINING THE PROCESS

Students write the task in their own words to better understand what is involved in the lab.

STEP TWO: BRAINSTORMING PRELIMINARY IDEAS

Students generate at least five possibilities.

STEP THREE: REFINEMENTS

This step involves choosing two of the brainstorming ideas and figuring out the materials and tools necessary for construction.

STEP FOUR: ANALYSIS

This step is the planning stage for two designs and includes estimating the size of the prototypes and identifying the steps necessary for the construction of each.

STEP FIVE: DECISION AND CONSTRUCTION

One design was decided upon and constructed. Students kept a step by step list detailing assembly, identified what changes were necessary from the planning stage, made accurate measurements of the prototype and sketched it from a top and side view.

STEP SIX: IMPLEMENTATION

Students will have their sled timed on three trials. Besides completing the math calculations students had to also answer a series of evaluative questions regarding their design and their design process.

The weather has not cooperated with the initial plan to get the first part of the new playground installed; it became too cold too quickly. The installers of the playground will wait for warmer weather to proceed with the playground installation.

The students and staff have not been majorily bothered by the demolition/media center project in the building. The old offices and boardroom will now become the media center for the elementary. The project is projected to be finished by the end of March. Mrs. Brady has had to put up with the noise of the jackhammer the last few days but understands that soon, that part of the project will end. Our staff were flexible with the clutter in the hallway over the Christmas break and found their way to the copier. Roger did a great job getting the school ready for the return of students and staff. Staff who were moved out of the construction areas have found new homes.

The middle school students recently completed their interdisciplinary units, themed units of study over different curricular areas. The 6th grade learned more about the Middle Ages through various activities, the 7th grade learned survival skills, and the 8th grade participated in building Rube Goldberg machines which were judged by local engineers. This was a great start for the 3rd quarter of school.

The elementary and middle school teachers and students are beginning to get ready for Iowa Assessments. Teachers will be sharing with students test taking tips and ideas of how to do their best on the tests. Plans are now in place for the Iowa Assessments which will be spread over 2 weeks in February for grades 2- 11. I ask parents to remind students to get good rest and to eat a good breakfast during the testing time and all the time. I expect students to do their best on these assessments, showing what they know and following the test taking strategies. When students give their best effort, the data collected is an accurate portrayal of what our students are learning. Incentives for the middle school grades showing growth on the assessment include earning extra free time in the gym, open concession stand, and pizza party. Growth incentives/rewards for the elementary grades also includes added free-time.

Kindergarten round-up will take place on February 18. We plan to run two sessions of "K for the Day," keeping the same preschool schedule for the students. Preschool student transportation will not have to change. No kindergarten students will come to school on February 18.

MEDICATION SAFETY

While the school is a place of learning, there may be times when students may need to take either prescription or non-prescription medication at school. With more and more over-the-counter and prescription drug abuse, I would like to remind parents and students that we want to keep all medications safe and secure. School policy states that the all medications are to be turned into the school office and can be given once the parent or guardian completes and signs the medication authorization form.

I strongly discourage sending medications with students of any age. I recommend that any and all medications go from an adult to an adult to ensure safety and security of that medication. If medication is not turned into the office appropriately, we cannot ensure that medication is not being shared, used incorrectly, or even abused.

While this may be inconvenient, it improves the safety and security of medications given at school. Now Iowa law does allow rescue medications like an epi-pen and inhalers to be carried by the student at all times. In these cases, those students need to be identified and an emergency or asthma plan should be created and put in place to best serve the needs of the student.

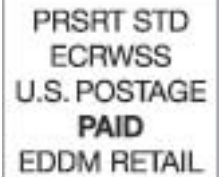
