MAINTENANCE UPDATE

I would like to explain what happened in Odebolt the weekend of December 7th and 8th when we had to shut off the water in town. On Friday, December 6th, I received a call informing me that the school was without water. We started to research what may have happened and nothing showed up that we could see.

Around 7:00 pm on Friday evening, Bill, Odebolt City employee, reported to us that there was a hole in the school's 4" service line to the building. The reason we had not seen it was because the water was running directly into a sewer manhole just a couple feet from the water service line. Bill and Dan from the City of Odebolt lined up Gary Roth and Greg Neville to come in Saturday morning to cut the concrete and dig up the water service line. After a lot of digging and pumping water from the ditch we were able to find the leak. Bill put a repair clamp on the leak; we filled the hole back in and thought that we had taken care of the problem.

On Sunday morning around 1:30 am Bill received a call letting him know that the line was leaking once again. At 10:30 Sunday morning we all got back together to dig the hole again and try to find the new problem. Once again, after a lot of digging and pumping water we were able to find the problem. This time it was a 3" hole in the top of the water line about 8 feet from the repair that was made the day before.

At that point, in order to prevent repeat occurrences, we replaced an 8 ft. section of pipe. Bill and Dan cut out the damaged pipe and replaced it with new. I

would like to say that Bill and Dan from the City of Odebolt did all that they could to keep the water on for most of the town; however, in the end the only alternative was to shut the town down so the repairs could be made.

I would like to thank everyone in Odebolt for putting up with the inconvenience of not having water two days in a row, on a weekend no less. I would also like to thank Odebolt City crew members, Bill and Dan, for all they did for the school. They didn't have to help at all; but they did so we were able to have school Monday morning. Thank you to Gary and Greg for all they did for us also.

I apologize to Brody Veit and the Mat Rats for having to postpone their wrestling tournament set for Saturday, December 7th. Thank you for being so understanding. I assure you that we always have the best interests of our students/your children in mind.

DRIVER'S EDUCATION

We will begin registration for driver's education on January 7th, 2014. Registration can be done in either the high school or the middle school office. The total fee for 2013-14 is \$350.00. A deposit of any amount must be made at the time of registration. The total amount will be due 3 weeks prior to the start of class. If student currently has a waiver for school fees, this would reduce the total amount due. Students must have their driver's permit before registering. A COPY OF STUDENT'S PERMIT must accompany the registration form.

Please be aware that this course does take a big time commitment for students to successfully complete. Unexcused absences or missing more than one class may require the student to repeat the class the following year. All requirements must be met in one year. CLASSROOM TIME: 30 hours required. DRIVING TIME: 12 hours (6 hours driving, 6 hours riding) An outside of class driving log is also required. These requirements will be detailed by the instructor.

At this time we are not sure of the times, dates or number of sessions that will be offered. The first 35 students registered will be in the first session.

CURRICULUM CLIPS ALICIA NELSON, DIRECTOR



“FROM COMMON CORE STANDARDS TO CURRICULUM: FIVE BIG IDEAS”

Jay McTighe and Grant Wiggins, in their paper “From Common Core Standards to Curriculum: Five Big Ideas”, explore five key understandings about translating the Core Standards into curriculum. All staff, parents, and community members for effective implementation of curriculum can support these “big ideas” as we move.

Big Idea #1:

The Common Core Standards have new emphases and require a careful reading.

It is a misconception to assume that these standards merely require minor “tweaks” to our curriculum and instructional practice. McTighe and Wiggins suggest NOT zeroing in on the grade-level standards before a careful examination of the goals and structure of the overall documents. We’ll start instead with the “blueprint” - with an overall vision of the “end in mind,” together teachers can create learning that fits together across the grade-level and throughout the building and district.

Big Idea #2:

Standards are NOT curriculum.

The standards define what all students are expected to know and be able to do, not how teachers should teach. Educators must translate the standards into engaging and effective curriculum. The curriculum should work with the standards to frame optimal learning experiences.

Big Idea #3:

Standards need to be “unpacked.”

Consider “unpacking” the standards into four broad categories - 1) long-term transfer goals, 2) overarching understanding, 3) overarching essential questions, and 4) a set of recurring cornerstone tasks. Transfer goals identify the effective uses of content understanding, knowledge and skill sought in the long run - *what kids can do when they confront new challenges, in and outside of school.*

Big Idea #4:

A coherent curriculum is mapped backwards from desired performances.

The key to avoiding an overly discrete and fragmented curriculum is to design backward from complex performances that require content. The key and initial question for curriculum development is NOT “What will we teach and when should we teach it?” Rather, THE question for curriculum development must be goal focused. “Having learned key content, what will students be able to do with it?”

Big Idea #5:

The standards come to life through the assessments.

The standards refer to the desired qualities of student work and the degree of rigor that must be addressed and achieved. The performance-based conception of standards lies at the heart of what is needed to translate the Core into a successfully working curriculum-assessment system.

FAFSA

As we enter 2014, seniors will begin filling out financial aid information for their post-secondary plans. A major part of applying for financial aid is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). While a PIN can be applied for at any time, the actual application can only be filled out after January 1st. If you haven’t filled out the FAFSA before, or the thought is intimidating for you, the Iowa College Access Network will be coming to our school on February 6th from 5:00 - 7:30 to assist students and their families in filling out the FAFSA. Please mark your calendars for this evening if you are filling out the FAFSA this year – we hope the Iowa College Access Network’s assistance will help you and your student understand the FAFSA more completely!

SCHEDULING FOR 2014-2015 SCHOOL YEAR

At the end of December, students worked on choosing classes for next school year. This month the master schedule will be finalized and students will be registered for classes through JMC. Parents, please speak with your students about taking appropriate and challenging classes. Taking classes that expand their perception is a great way to help them prepare not only for college, but also help prepare them for leaving the world of high school behind and entering into their new reality. We know that life is challenging, and helping motivate our students not to hide from adversity but to fight through it is a fundamental life skill important for them to learn. IOWA ASSESSMENTS

The Iowa Assessments are standardized tests taken by our students that help show how prepared students are for post-secondary education, and how close our school is to meeting the common core standards of the state of Iowa. This year, our testing will take place the first full week of February, which is February 3-7. The schedule will be:

- +Monday February 3rd
 - 8:35-9:20 Reading
 - 9:25-9:45 Vocabulary
- +Tuesday February 4th
 - 8:30-9:15 Written Expression
- +Wednesday February 5th
 - 8:30-9:15 Science
- +Thursday February 6th
 - 8:30-9:15 Mathematics (calculators allowed)
- +Friday February 7th
 - 8:30-9:15 Social Studies
 - 9:20-9:35 Computation

Seniors do not have to report to school until the end of Iowa Assessments each day. The only exception will be that one day that week, seniors will come in at regular time to fill out I Have A Plan Iowa requirements. Students will be given a schedule of what day they will need to come in to complete this state requirement.



CHRISTENSEN RECEIVES DON TAFT AWARD

The Iowa Football Coaches Association award the Don Taft Coaching Award based on longevity, the body of work a coach has done with kids and the nomination of the district's head football coach.

The selection committee chose three middle school coaches to receive the award this year. This is the second time (2003) that Roger Christensen has received this from the Iowa Football Coaches Association.

The award is named for Don Taft, who coached in Mount Pleasant for a number of years and was credited with helping many young men to grow up. This was Christensen's 32nd season coaching football at the middle school level.

SCHOOL-TO-CAREER STUDENTS EARN NATIONAL CAREER READINESS CERTIFICATES

Fifteen School-to-Career students and two alternative high school students recently completed the National Career Readiness testing administered by the Iowa Workforce Development November 18-22. Based on their test results, students could earn 1 of 4 certificates: Platinum, Gold, Silver, or Bronze. Platinum signifies the recipient has skills for 99% of the jobs in ACT's extensive database of occupational profiles. Gold signifies skills for 90%, Silver for 65% , and Bronze for 35% of the jobs in ACT's database.

The testing is composed of three WorkKeys® assessments that measure skills critical to on-the-job success. The three areas covered are applied mathematics, reading for information, and locating information. Many employers use this as a pre-employment test. The certificate earned is a work-related skills credential that provides objective evidence of employees' skills that can be accepted nationwide. There are a number of local employers that accept these certificates. One OABCIG student earned a Gold certificate, 12 earned Silver and 4 earned Bronze.

INTERDISCIPLINARY UNITS BY DEE BOGER

On January 2 and 3rd the OA-BCIG Middle School students will be participating in interdisciplinary units. An interdisciplinary unit is a method used to teach a unit across different curricular disciplines. The middle school teachers have created grade level interdisciplinary units organized around a particular theme. Sixth graders will be learning more about the Middle Ages. Some of these activities will include making castles, building catapults, playing nine-man Morris, and jousting. The theme for the 7th graders will be Survivor with students learning some basic first aid and basics of CPR. Rube Goldberg is the theme for the eighth graders. Students will be collaboratively building machines capable of doing a very simple task in a very complex way to be judged by local engineers.

Benefits of interdisciplinary units include:

- Subject matter is reinforced and integrated
- Activities require higher order thinking
- Students are actively involved in drawing connections among subjects, making decisions, and solving problems
- Choices are available and collaboration is encouraged
- Students see the whole context of what they are learning

Feel free to stop by the middle school on these days to check out the students in action.

Exclusion, what does it mean?

In group settings, like school, there is always discussion on when an illness requires exclusion, or when a child should stay home or go home from school because of illness. As we all know, children will get sick, but how does one decide if they should be in school or not?

Two things to think about are; what is best for the child, and what is best for all of the other children in school. Common colds, runny noses, headaches, or stomachaches would not require exclusion unless the child had other additional symptoms of illness. These symptoms may include: fever, uncontrolled diarrhea, change in behavior, difficulty breathing, sore throat, pain, or a decrease in responsiveness. Below are examples of when a child should be kept home or may be sent home from school:

- The illness prevents the child from comfortably participating in the daily activities
- The illness creates a greater need for care, and would compromise the ability of staff to care for the other children.
- The illness creates a health threat to other students.
- A child that is clearly ill.

As a reminder effective handwashing both at home and at school will prevent the spread of most common illnesses and can keep our children healthy.



Online safety is important! The OA 5th grade students learned about Avoiding Online Predators and the 5th grade from both buildings learned about Stopping Cyberbullying. We used the Cybersmart ebooks to develop our classroom discussions and drew in related news items to make these lessons more relevant.

In January, the 4th grade classes will be studying Protecting Your Online Privacy and the 3rd grade classes will be working through Avoiding Online Predators.

Please remember that parents are one of the best tools for keeping children safe when online. Encourage your child to talk to you about what they are doing online and remind them to report to you if they ever receive a threatening or uncomfortable message. Almost every lesson included this reminder.
