Update on Reorganization Issues and Questions

Last month I provided information regarding the Petition for Reorganization and indicated that the signature collection process for the Petition for Reorganization has begun. The Odebolt-Arthur Community School District needs to collect the signatures of 275 registered voters, or residents who are eligible to be a registered voter and the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School District needs to collect the signatures of 400 eligible voters.

Who is eligible to sign the Petition for Reorganization?

 A person must be a resident of the designated district (the documents are designed for each district, one specifically for Odebolt-Arthur patrons and one for Battle Creek-Ida Grove patrons, however a person could sign any petition document but only once),

- A person must include their address on the petition,
- A person must print their name legibly on the petition
- A person must indicate if they are or are not a registered voter in the district.
- A person must be an eligible voter which means they must be a U.S. citizen, be an Iowa resident, must be at least 17 ½ years of age and will turn 18 years of age by the day of the proposed election on September 13, 2016.

It is our hope that you will seriously consider the issues related to reorganization and Petition sign the Reorganization to move this to the next phase of the process which is to submit the petition documents to the Northwest and Prairie Lakes Area Education Agencies Boards of Directors for their review and so that they can hold a public hearing on the issue once enough signatures have been acquired.

Some Questions Related to the Issue of Reorganization

At the last joint regular meeting of the Odebolt-Arthur and Battle Creek-Grove School Boards held on Monday, April 11, 2016, the board members discussed a number of issues, concerns and questions that have been brought up over the past month such as:

What are the intentions of the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Board Members in regards to

the building in Odebolt, elementary grades, middle school, etc?

At the Joint Board Meeting held on Monday, April 11, 2016, the Battle Creek-Ida Grove School Board Members stated that the building in Odebolt is tremendously important and is needed to provide academic and activity programming for our students. The board members went on to state that there is no space available in any other building for those students and programs. The building in Odebolt is vital to the school districts

Do the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Board Members have intentions to tear down the existing High School building and Ida Grove and construct a new building large enough to house the Middle School and the High School grades and programs?

During the meeting the Battle Creek-Ida Grove stated that they have absolutely no plans to tear down and construct a new building. They again stated their commitment to the middle school in Odebolt and asserted their plans and hopes to work together to improve both facilities, the Middle School in Odebolt and the High School in Ida Grove.

Will the elementary grades in Odebolt be moved to Ida Grove once the new addition is completed?


As stated earlier by the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Board Members, absolutely not. The addition project currently underway at the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Elementary School will add much needed space to an already overcrowded building plus add a new gym with adequate space for the Physical Education program,

other programs, concerts, activity practices and ballgames. The addition does not add space that would accommodate adding another 160 elementary students to the building.

Doesn't the Battle Creek-Ida Grove School Board just want to get their hands of the funds from the Odebolt-Arthur School District?

Over the course of the whole grade sharing experience the Odebolt-Arthur CSD has spent \$4,462,137.02 of its funds from 2009-2010 through 2014-2015 to pay for whole grade sharing expenses to Battle Creek-Ida Grove. This school year the Odebolt-Arthur CSD is sending 76 students to OA-BCIG High School as part of whole grade sharing. During the same timeframe the Battle Creek-Ida Grove CSD has spent \$5,804,148.77 of its funds from 2009-2010 through 2014-2015 to pay for whole grade sharing expenses to Odebolt-Arthur. This school year the Battle Creek-Ida Grove CSD is sending 152 students to OA-BCIG Middle School as part of whole grade sharing. The two school districts have been sharing resources to help each other fund programs for nearly seven fiscal years and if the districts reorganize the new district would continue to expend similar resources to adequately provide for the academic and activity programming that

our students and families need, want and deserve. Combining the two district's resources through reorganization will provide the new district the opportunity to maintain high quality academic and activity programs for all students and it will provide the new district with the ability to maintain and upgrade the district's facilities for the benefit of our students and our communities.

Last Day of School Information

As of Thursday, March 31, 2016, the Odebolt-Arthur and Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School Districts have lost 43.5 hours of instructional time or 6.69 days of school due to weather related cancellations, early dismissals or late starts. Towards the end of February I provided information to you that indicated that the last scheduled day of school at that time would be Tuesday, May 31 but if we didn't have another snow day we would actually end classes on Friday, May 27 rather than bring students back for one day after the Memorial Day weekend.

Unfortunately we have had an additional snow day on Thursday, March 24 so now we will be adding back the student makeup day on Tuesday, May 31 and a student makeup day on Wednesday, June 1. The last staff workday will now be Thursday, June 2. Seniors will still finish

their school year on Thursday, May 19.

The school year has gone by quickly, and it wasn't that long ago that we were excited about the new school year, harvest, football, and volleyball. Now summer plans are beginning to take shape and thoughts of spending time at the local pool are in our heads. We still have a number of days left of school, and we want to make sure that students are engaged in the learning activities. As the summer approaches, kids often are more restless and distracted at school. You can help make sure that their last weeks of school are productive by ensuring that they begin the day with a nutritious breakfast.

Studies show a good breakfast makes kids more alert, less distractible and better behaved in school; it even improves their test scores. Let's keep our children focused by making sure they begin every school day with a balanced meal at home or at school. With the end of the year approaching, we will continue to hold high expectations for academic output, behavior, and attendance. Teachers will expect hard work and continue to assign learning activities as we still have much teaching and learning to do.

With the warmer weather on the way, it is good to revisit the dress code. The following is taken from Code No. 502.1 of board policy which addresses student appearance: The board expects students to be clean and well-groomed, wear clothes in good repair and appropriate for the time, place and occasion. Clothing or other apparel promoting products illegal for use by minors and clothing displaying obscene material, profanity, or reference to prohibited conduct are disallowed. While the primary responsibility for appearance lies with the students and their

parents, appearance disruptive to the education program will not be tolerated. When, in the judgment of a principal, a student's appearance or mode of dress disrupts the educational process or constitutes a threat to health or safety, the student may be required to make modifications.

Please remind your children who are riding bikes to and from school, that when other students are present on school grounds, that the bicycles are to be walked. This is really important after school as there is a lot of foot traffic. We are trying to avoid an incident or two.

May is a very busy month with field trips, field day, and various other activities. We will always try to keep parents updated as best as possible to all the upcoming events we have in the elementary and middle school. May 6 will be the 5th grade orientation visit to the Middle School. This will include a guided tour, information about classes and expectations for next year, and time to answer questions.

- <u>www.mackinvia.com</u> Find both fiction and nonfiction ebooks and some audio books. A username/password is also required and they are the same as Iowa AEA Online.
- <u>Summer reading programs</u> Battle Creek, Ida Grove, Arthur, and Odebolt public libraries each provide summer reading programs. Call your public library for more information.
- <u>Most importantly, READ!</u> Children who read at least twenty minutes per day have a better chance of maintaining their reading level over the summer months. They don't need to read a book daily! Read game directions, read a recipe and follow the instructions, or read a newspaper or magazine. Just READ!

Health Requirements for 2016-17 School Year Mrs. Tiffanie Lindberg, School Nurse

As the 2015-2016 school year is coming to an end, planning begins for the 2016-2017 school year. Here are the health requirements for the 2016-2017 school year:

- Incoming Preschoolers- Should have a vision screening completed.
- Incoming <u>Kindergartners</u>- Immunizations for entry to school (the school will need a copy of the immunization record), a dental screening from the dentist or hygienist (forms on school website under "registration"), and blood lead testing.
- Incoming 7th graders- Required to have a Tdap booster. Can be administered in conjunction with a sports physical. The school will need an updated copy of the immunization record.
- Incoming <u>Freshman</u>- Required to have a dental screening form on file. This can be filled out by a dentist or hygienist at a routine visit. (Copies of the forms can be found on the school website under "registration").

Proper Footwear for P.E. Ms. Jamie Boege BCIG Elem. Physical Education

It's time to talk about proper footwear for physical education class! Not only do we want to wear proper, clean tennis shoes for our impending new gym floor next year, we want to wear proper shoes for our feet during movement and exercise.

For students own safety when coming to P.E. the expectation is that students are wearing appropriate shoes as it is essential for physical activity. Sometimes children's footwear is chosen based upon what is aesthetically pleasing rather than what is best for safety and efficient movement. Style is often the major reason a particular pair of shoes is worn and they are often not suitable for P.E.

Athletic tennis shoes are built to provide support to your foot and ankle during physical activity, and as a result they help reduce the risk of fractures and sprains while active. We sometimes see leg, ankle and foot injuries that could have been prevented if proper athletic footwear had been worn. Please understand that the necessity of wearing proper shoes is 100% instruction and safety driven.

Running shoes, basketball shoes, cross training shoes, and tennis shoes are ideal in a physical education setting. While skateboarding shoes are not ideal for physical activity they are acceptable in P.E. (flat bottom shoes).

What an ideal P.E. shoe looks like:

- Shoe fits the foot, not slipping out.
- Shoe has a back where heel is not exposed.
- Shoe has an appropriate bottom where running will not hurt the foot

For the physical education department, I will be collecting donated shoes to be stored at school for students that forget their tennis shoes. 
