New Whole Grade Sharing Agreement To Be Negotiated

Following the failed vote for school district reorganization, the Odebolt-Arthur Community School District Board of Directors met in a special meeting on Tuesday, September 20 in the OA-BCIG Middle School Library at 6:30 p.m. There were approximately 30 students, parents, staff and patrons in attendance. On Thursday, September 22 the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School District Board of Directors met in special session in the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Elementary Gym at 6:30 p.m. There were approximately 130 students, parents, staff and patrons in attendance.

The purpose of the special meetings was to address two important issues. Each district needed to hold a required organizational meeting to administer the oath of office to the newly elected board members, Ryan Schroeder for Odebolt-Arthur and Danika Hinkeldey for Battle Creek-Ida Grove and to elect officers for this year. In addition, each district discussed the results and implications of the failed vote for reorganization.

During the special meetings, the board members heard comments, concerns, thoughts and ideas from students, parents, and patrons regarding the failed vote and their overwhelming desire to keep the whole grade sharing agreement intact for the 2017-2018 school year. A number of parents and patrons asked that the board members consider giving reorganization another chance within six months to a year.

The following is a summary of the comments and input from the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Special Board Meeting held on Thursday, September 22, 2016, prior to the vote to terminate the current whole grade sharing agreement:

- there was significant frustration that the vote failed in Odebolt,
- there was an impassioned frustration that the vote appeared to have failed due to a lot of misleading information, information that was not true, and

information designed to make patrons fearful of reorganization that was distributed throughout the Odebolt community,

- there was a consistent theme in the comments made to the Board that whole grade sharing has worked so well that after seven years of overwhelming success it seemed to make sense to formally commit to the long term stability of the partnership by approving reorganization which three of the four communities did in overwhelming fashion,
- due to the fact that it was apparent that the majority of the patrons of Odebolt wanted nothing to do with reorganization, that it was time to move forward and focus on the BCIG district, and work to make BCIG the best district it can be,
- there were concerns raised about the students of OA-BCIG and what would happen to them if the partnership between the districts is ended,
- there were concerns raised about the students, parents and patrons who voted yes for reorganization,
- but the overwhelming message received by the BCIG Board during the special meeting and in letters and emails leading up to the meeting was that it was time to move on and terminate the whole grade sharing agreement.

After listening to the parents, patrons, and students during the special meeting and in the days leading up to the meeting, the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Board of Directors voted to terminate the current whole grade sharing agreement effective July 1, 2017.

However, the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Board of Directors also voted to invite the Odebolt-Arthur Board of Directors to enter into negotiations to create a new whole grade sharing agreement that would go into effect with the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year. In order for that to happen, there are some deadlines that must be met in addition to successfully negotiating a new agreement. The deadlines include:

- Each school district must pass a

Notice of Intent to Negotiate a Whole Grade Sharing Agreement no later than November 1, 2016, (Both school boards passed a resolution to publish a Notice of Intent to Negotiate a New Agreement on Tuesday, October 11.).

- Each school district must publish notice of and hold a public hearing on the proposed new whole grade sharing agreement prior to formally approving the agreement,
- Each school district must formally approve and sign a new whole grade sharing agreement prior to February 1, 2017 in order for it to be effective for the 2017-2018 school year.

Following the special meetings, each school board held work sessions to begin discussions on the issue of whole grade sharing, what they would want in an agreement, further discussions on reorganization, facilities planning, academic program planning, among other things. The following is a brief summary of those work sessions.

On Monday, October 3, 2016, the Odebolt-Arthur Community School District Board of Directors met in a work session at 6:30 p.m. in the OA-BCIG Middle School Library. There were approximately 75 patrons, staff, parents and students in attendance plus Dr. Jeff Herzberg, the Chief Administrator of Prairie Lakes AEA to assist the board in their discussions.

On Tuesday, October 4, 2016, the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School District Board of Directors met in a work session at 6:30 p.m. in the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Elementary School Gym. There were approximately 50 patrons, staff, parents and students in attendance plus Dr. Timothy Grieves, the Chief Administrator of Northwest AEA to assist the board in their discussions.

On Sunday, October 9, 2016, the Odebolt-Arthur Community School District Board of Directors met in a work session at 7:00 p.m. in the Odebolt-Arthur Elementary School Library. There were approximately 60 patrons, staff,

parents, and students in attendance.

On Tuesday, October 11, 2016, the Odebolt-Arthur Community School District Board of Directors and the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School District Board of Directors met for a joint regular board meeting in the Battle Creek-Ida Grove Elementary School Gym. There were approximately 75 students, staff, parents, and patrons in attendance. In addition, Dr. Timothy Grieves, Chief Administrator of the Northwest AEA was present to assist the school board members as they begin the work that needs to be done to come to an agreement on a new whole grade sharing agreement for the 2017-2018 school year.

Several students, staff members, and a significant number of parents and patrons addressed the board members during the special meetings on September 20 and September 22 and during the work sessions on October 3, October 4 and October 9 and also at the joint board meeting on Tuesday, October 11. In summary the students, patrons, and parents addressed a number of issues during their presentations that included:

- asking the board members questions as to their intentions related to the failed vote,
- asking about their intentions regarding the future of whole grade sharing,
- asking the board members to find a way to keep whole grade sharing in place for the 2017-2018 school year or until a vote to reorganize can be held again,
- asking the board members to support another vote on reorganization within the next six months to a year,
- asking the board members to focus on what is best for the students and families that the OA-BCIG partnership has been serving since 2009-2010,
- several parents and patrons stated that they have no desire to share with another district, they want to stay OA-BCIG,
- a number of parents and patrons indicated that they are opposed to a one-way share
- a number of staff members, parents and patrons asked the board members to find a way to work together to keep OA-BCIG intact for the good of the students and families.

During the special meetings, the work sessions, and the joint regular board meeting, the board members discussed a number of issues including:

OA-BCIG High School Happenings

As we move forward I will once again stress positive sportsmanship. We all must remember that there will be calls during a game that do not go our way, there will be mistakes made by coaches, and kids. We will win some games and we will lose some games, but we always want to remain positive

- continue to whole grade share in the same manner that the two districts do now,
- consider a one-way sharing agreement that would leave OA-BCIG High School for grades 9-12 as is and both districts provide a PK-8 program on their own,
- create benchmarks that would have to be met that includes; continue whole grade sharing through 2017-2018, all board members work to support a successful vote for reorganization within six to twelve months, a facilities committee would work to complete a comprehensive facilities plan for the building in Odebolt and the high school building in Ida Grove as soon as possible and a committee would be created to evaluate academic programs and offerings in the two districts to develop a five year plan to enhance our academic programs,
- work on overcoming differences between the two boards so that they can focus on the issues that need to be addressed rather than their attitude towards each other,
- addressed concerns regarding how information was distributed to patrons that was misleading, created fear about reorganization, or was not true leading up to the vote for reorganization,
- a need to clarify the difference between whole grade sharing versus operational sharing,
- a discussion on the board configuration that was in the petition and the options available or considered during the process to finalize the petition,

On Tuesday, October 11, 2016, during the joint regular board meeting the board members were presented with information on state accreditation requirements for both a high school and a middle school, course offerings at the middle school and high school levels today compared to the year prior to whole grade sharing, information on staffing history, and information on enrollment projections. The board members were provided with some financial information that showed the impact of a 50/50 split of the academic programs and some enrollment projections that take into account projected open enrollment. In addition, the board members were shown the various options that have been discussed at the work sessions over the past two weeks which include:

- **Option 1:** Whole grade sharing stays the same but only for one more year.
- Each district would be required to approve a memorandum of understanding that would

include stipulations like; each board would positively support the whole grade sharing agreement for the 2017-2018 school year, each board would support a vote on reorganization no later than September of 2017, support for a new vote on reorganization means: assist in the collection of petition signatures, assist in disseminating accurate information regarding reorganization that must be approved by each board, each board must assist in correcting information regarding reorganization that is not true or is misleading in an effort to better inform the patrons prior to a vote on reorganization, a new joint facilities committee will be created and a joint academic program task force will be created.

- **Option 2:** Revised whole grade sharing agreement for the 2017-2018 with everything remaining the same as the current agreement except the funding formula would be changed to a 50/50 split of educational costs instead of by percentage of students. This option would also include the Memorandum of Understanding.
- **Option 3:** One way sharing agreement with OA-BCIG High School for grades 9-12 in Ida Grove and the two districts providing PK-8 programs on their own with a Cooperative Agreement for 7th and 8th Grade Activities as OA-BCIG and it includes the Memorandum of Understanding.

The options listed above are the starting point for negotiations based on the conversations and discussions from the board work sessions. The two boards will meet again in a combined work session on Tuesday, October 18 at 6:30 p.m. in the BCIG Elementary School Gym to continue the negotiations process.

The two boards have been asked to try and finish up a new agreement and hold a public hearing on the tentative agreement by Thanksgiving so that students, families, and staff members will know what they will have available to them in the next school year. If the two boards fail to come up with an agreement by February 1, then each district would be on their own to provide PK-12 programs for their students.

Book Fair at BCIG Elementary

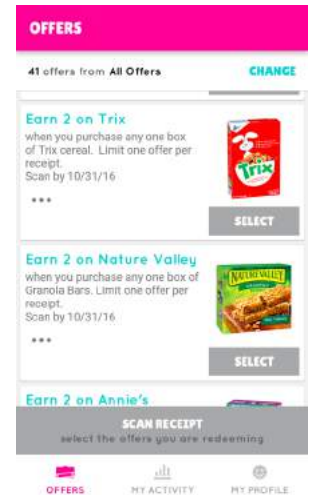

BCIG Elementary Computer Science Enrichment

Computer science is a foundational subject for all 21st century careers. Currently, there are 109 third, fourth, and fifth graders that have begun their adventures of learning how to code on the Code.org website. This exposure to computer programming provides enhancement in their learning throughout various academic areas and reinforces what classroom teachers teach aligning with the standards of the Common Core. It supports and enhances a growth mindset by challenging the learner and teaching perseverance.

Code.org blends traditional instruction with online learning and helps students internalize what it means to be self-motivated. The program is student driven, self-guided, and self-paced with familiar characters (Angry Birds, Minecraft, Flappy Birds, Star Wars, Frozen, etc.) and personalized feedback. Students are provided authentic experimentation with skills such as sequencing, meaningful collaboration with others, problem-solving and perseverance techniques, internet safety, algorithms, binary code, societal impacts of computing, and digital citizenship. All students can benefit from studying the basics of computer science, regardless of whether they wish to become a doctor, entrepreneur, musician, or astronaut....they are only limited by their imagination and the effort they are willing to put into furthering their coding experience.

Two students interested in ag-related careers, Ethan Zobel and Kenny Hausman, attended a presentation and tour of the

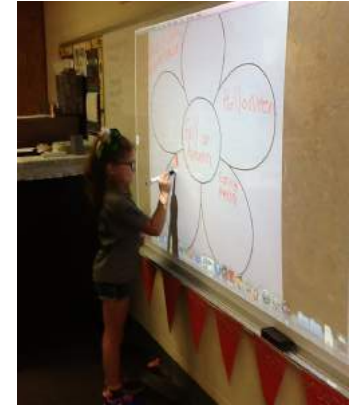
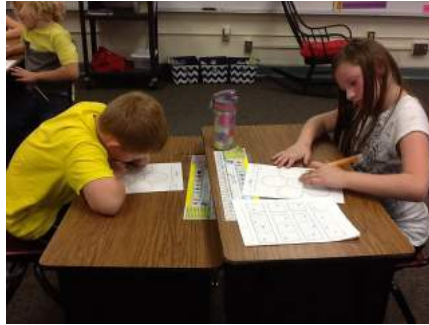

Asbestos Containing Materials

Code No. 804.4

Friable and non-friable asbestos-containing materials will be maintained in good condition and appropriate precautions will be followed when the material is disturbed for any reason. If there is a need to replace asbestos, it will be replaced with non-asbestos containing materials. Each

school building will maintain a copy of the asbestos management plan.

The school district will notify, appoint and train appropriate employees as necessary.

Tobacco-Free Environment

Code No. 905.2

School district facilities and grounds, including school vehicles, are off limits for tobacco use. This requirement extends to students, employees and visitors. This policy applies at all times, including school-sponsored and non school-sponsored events. Persons failing to abide by this request are required to dispose of the tobacco product or leave the school district premises immediately. It is the responsibility of the administration to enforce this policy.

Health Education

Code No. 603.5

Students in grade levels 1 through 12 will receive, as part of their health education, instruction about personal health, food and nutrition, environmental health, safety and survival skills, consumer health, family life, human growth and development, substance abuse and non-use, including the effects of alcohol, tobacco, drugs and poisons on the human body, human sexuality, self esteem, stress management, interpersonal relationships, emotional and social health, health resources, prevention and control of disease, communicable diseases, including acquired immune deficiency syndrome. The purpose of the health education program is to help each student protect, improve and maintain physical, emotional and social well-being.

The areas stated above shall be included in health education and the instruction shall be adapted at each grade level to aid understanding by the students.

Parents who object to health education instruction in human growth and development may file a written request that the pupil be excused from the instruction. The written request shall include a proposed alternate activity or study acceptable to the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall have the final authority to determine the alternate activity or study.

Notes from the Nurse

Fall has arrived, and winter is right around the corner! Here comes the patterns of inconsistent weather and ups and downs of illnesses. Now is a good time to think about getting a flu shot for your child/children and for yourself. There are some misconceptions in regards to the flu shot. According to the Center for Disease Control you cannot get the flu from the flu shot. There are many different strains of the flu, and the vaccination covers the strain that research believes will be the most prominent. The flu shot protects against the respiratory influenza not the "stomach flu". Some people do get a slight reaction or sore arm at the injection site, but those are mild symptoms in comparison to getting the

flu. Protect yourself and protect your family and friends and get vaccinated.

On another note, for school children especially, here comes hat season for the bitter cold days outside. In order to prevent the spread of head lice, please continue to encourage your children not to share hats, brushes, combs, and hair accessories. These little bugs are transmitted easily through the sharing of these items. The state law says a student cannot be excluded from school due to lice, but the parents will be contacted and then it is up to the parent if they would like to pick up their child in order start treatment of the child's head and treatment of the home. We ask that the student

brings back an empty bottle of the treatment, in order to verify treatment has been started. Lice is a hindrance, but it is not considered contagious, so therefore students and parents have the option to keep their child in school.

Lastly, if your child is in need of immunizations, please have these completed as soon as possible and let the school know or email me at tlindberg@oabcig.org. I have sent out emails to those that are in need of immunizations. If these are not completed, state law states the child can be prohibited from attending school until they are completed.
