# From the Superintendent Mr. Terry Kenealy, Superintendent

I hope that the first few weeks of the school year have been a wonderful experience for all of our students, parents, staff, and community members. There were a lot of changes put into place for the start of the school year, new staff members were hired and the buildings underwent a number upgrades to make the learning environment more comfortable for everyone. If you haven't had the opportunity to visit our school facilities yet this school year, please stop in and visit sometime. We would enjoy showing you around and answering your questions.

# Special Election on Tuesday, September 13

On Monday, June 20, 2016, the Northwest AEA Board of Directors and the Prairie Lakes AEA Board of Directors met in joint session to hold a public hearing on the Petition for Reorganization. The Northwest AEA Directors and the Prairie Lakes AEA Directors determined that the prerequisites for a vote on the question of reorganization had been met and they voted to approve the Petition for Reorganization and scheduled a special election in each district for Tuesday, September 13, In 2016. order reorganization to be approved a simple majority (50% plus one vote) of the votes cast in favor the question reorganization is required in each school district.

In addition, the Northwest AEA Directors and the Prairie Lakes AEA Directors determined that the electors of the two school districts be asked to approve a Revenue Purpose Statement at the same special election. The Revenue Purpose Statement would apply to the new school district if the

question of reorganization would be approved by the electors as provided for in Iowa Code. The Revenue Purpose Statement establishes the authority of a school district to utilize the Sales Tax Funds it receives from the State of Iowa and it defines how those funds could be used.

Also, each school district will be voting to fill a vacancy on each school board. The Odebolt-Arthur Community School District will be selecting a new director to complete the term of Naomi Lozier who resigned her position due to an upcoming relocation out of the district. At this time Ryan Schroeder has taken out paperwork to run for the position.

The Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School District will be selecting a new director to complete the term of Claussen. Danika Hinkeldey was appointed to fill that position this past spring and in accordance with state statute the electors need to vote to fill that position at the next school election which is September 13. As of now Danika Hinkeldey has filed to run for the position.

# **Voter Registration**

• An eligible resident may register to vote now through the day of the election.

(However it is simpler to get a voter registration form and complete it prior to the day of the election.)

# Voter registration forms are available in Sac County at Sac County online at <a href="https://www.saccounty.org">www.saccounty.org</a>, or they will mail them to you, or you can pick them up at the Sac County Auditor's Office, or you can pick them up at the school office in Odebolt.

- Voter registrations forms are available in Ida County by picking them up at the Ida County Auditor's Office, or you can request that they mail a form to you, or you may pick them up at the school offices in each building in Ida Grove.
- If an eligible resident chooses to register at the voting site on the day of the election they would need to present a valid driver's license that has their current resident address on it, or provide a current bill that the resident received at their residence, or have someone who lives in their voting precinct attest to their residency at the voting site.
- An eligible resident is a citizen of the United States, has not been convicted of a felony (or has had their voting rights restored), is at least 17 ½ years old, lives at the address listed on the registration form, has not been ruled incompetent to vote and does not claim the right to vote anywhere else.

# **Voting Methods**

 An eligible resident may vote on the day of the election at the voting site that covers the part of the school district that they reside in.

- An eligible resident may vote early by going to the courthouse of the county that their school district is located in, Ida or Sac, and completing an absentee ballot.
- An eligible resident may request an absentee ballot by phone or by mail from the Ida County Auditor's Office by September 2, 2016.
- An eligible resident may request an absentee ballot by phone, by mail or

online from the Sac County Auditor's Office by September 2, 2016.

An absentee ballot must be postmarked no later than Monday, September 12 or delivered in person to the County Auditor's Office the day of the election to be valid.

# **Building Goals 2016-17**

### **Schedule Change**

In an effort to improve learning opportunities on 1:00 early dismissal days we will be altering the class schedule. Typically we ran a shortened class schedule, allowing each class to meet, but only for a short time. This year we will hold a modified schedule, with only 4 periods meeting each early out day. On the first early out day of the month periods 1, 3, 5 and 7 will meet, on the second early out of the month periods 2, 4, 6, and 8 will meet. This allows us to hold classes for a longer period of time which in turn should provide more meaningful learning opportunities for students.

# **Proper Footwear for P.E.**Ms. Jamie Boege BCIG Elem. Physical Education

It's time to talk about proper footwear for physical education class! Not only do we want to wear proper, clean tennis shoes for our impending new gym floor next year, we want to wear proper shoes for our feet during movement and exercise.

For students own safety when coming to P.E. the expectation is that students are wearing appropriate shoes as it is essential for physical activity. Sometimes children's footwear is chosen based upon what is aesthetically pleasing rather than what is best for safety and efficient movement. Style is often the major reason a particular pair of shoes is worn and they are often not suitable for P.E.

Athletic tennis shoes are built to provide support to your foot and ankle during physical activity, and as a result they help reduce the risk of fractures and sprains while active. We sometimes see leg, ankle and foot injuries that could have been prevented if proper athletic footwear had been worn. Please understand that the necessity of wearing proper shoes is 100% instruction and safety driven.

Running shoes, basketball shoes, cross training shoes, and tennis shoes are ideal in a physical education setting. While skateboarding shoes are not ideal for physical activity they are acceptable in P.E. (flat bottom shoes).

What an ideal P.E. shoe looks like:

- Shoe fits the foot, not slipping out.
- Shoe has a back where heel is not exposed.
- Shoe has an appropriate bottom where running will not hurt the foot.

For the physical education department, I will be collecting donated shoes to be stored at school for students that forget their tennis shoes. I am looking for shoes in a range of sizes that are clean and in good shape. If you have any you are looking to donate, you can bring them to school with your child or drop them off at my office in the gym.

# **Bullying and Harassment**

The Odebolt-Arthur and Battle Creek-Ida Grove Community School Districts do not tolerate bullying and/or harassment of their students. In accordance with that view the OA & BCIG School Boards have adopted the following Anti Bullying/Harassment Board Policy No. 104 as follows:

Series 100 Code No. <u>104</u>

### ANTI-BULLYING/HARASSMEN T POLICY

Harassment and bullying of students and employees are against federal, state and local policy, and are not tolerated by the boards. The boards are committed to providing all students with a safe and civil school environment in which all members of the school communities are treated with dignity and respect. To that end, the boards have in place policies, procedures, practices that are designed to reduce and eliminate bullying and harassment as well as processes and procedures to deal with incidents of bullying and harassment. Bullying and harassment of students by other students, by school employees, and by volunteers who have direct contact with students will not be tolerated in the school or school districts.

prohibit The boards harassment, bullying, hazing or any other victimization of students, based on any of the following actual or perceived traits or characteristics, including but not limited to age, color, creed, national origin, race, religion, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical attributes, physical or mental ability or disability, ancestry, political party preference, political belief, socioeconomic status, or familial status. Harassment against employees based upon the employee's race, color, creed, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, religion, age or disability is also prohibited.

This policy is in effect

while students or employees are on property within the jurisdiction of the boards; while on school-owned or school-operated vehicles; while attending or engaged in school-sponsored activities; and while away from school grounds if the misconduct directly affects the good order, efficient management and welfare of the school or school districts.

If, after an investigation, a student is found to be in violation of this policy, the student shall be disciplined by appropriate measures which may include suspension or expulsion. If after an investigation a school employee is found to be in violation of this policy, the employee shall be disciplined appropriate measures which include may If after an termination. investigation school a volunteer is found to be in violation of this policy, the volunteer shall be subject to appropriate measures which may include exclusion from school grounds. "Volunteer" means an individual who has regular, significant contact with students.

When looking as the totality of the circumstances, harassment and means any electronic, written, verbal or physical act or conduct toward a student which is based on any actual perceived trait characteristic of the student and which creates objectively hostile school environment that meets one or more of the following conditions:

- Places the student in reasonable fear of harm to the student's person or property;
- Has a substantially detrimental effect on the student's physical or mental health;
- Has the effect of substantially interfering with the student's academic performance; or

 Has the effect of substantially interfering with the student's ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities or privileges provided by a school.

"Electronic" means any communication involving the transmission of information by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic, or other similar means. "Electronic" includes, but is not limited to communication via electronic mail, internet-based communications, pager service, cell phones, electronic text messaging or similar technologies.

Harassment and bullying may include, but are not limited to, the following behaviors and circumstances:

- Repeated remarks of a demeaning nature;
- Implied or explicit threats concerning one's grades, achievements, property, etc.
- Demeaning jokes, stories, or activities directed at the student; and/or
- Unreasonable interferences with a student's performance.

Sexual Harassment of a student by an employee means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- Submission to the conduct is made either implicitly or explicitly a term or condition of the student's education or benefits;
- Submission to or rejection of the conduct is used as the basis for academic decisions affecting that student; or
- The conduct has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with the student's academic performance by creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive education environment.

In situations between students and school officials, faculty, staff or volunteers who have direct contact with students, bullying and harassment may also include the following behaviors:

- Requiring that a student submit to bullying or harassment by another student, either explicitly or implicitly, as a term or condition of the targeted student's education or participation in school programs or activities; and/or
- Requiring a submission to or rejection of such conduct as a basis for decisions affecting the student.

Any person who promptly, reasonably, and in good faith reports an incident of bullying or harassment under this policy to a school official, shall be immune from civil or criminal liability relating to such report and to the person's participation in any administrative, judicial, or other proceeding relating to the report.

Individuals who knowingly file a false complaint may be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Retaliation against any person, because the person has filed a bullying or harassment complaint or assisted or participated in a harassment investigation or proceeding, is also prohibited. Individuals who knowingly file false harassment complaints and any person who gives false statements in an investigation shall be subject to discipline by appropriate measures, as shall any person who is found to have retaliated against another in violation of this policy. Any student found to have retaliated in violation of this policy shall be subject to measures up to, and including, suspension and expulsion. Any school employee found to have retaliated in violation of this policy shall be subject to measures up to, and including, termination of employment.

Any school volunteer found to have retaliated in violation of this policy shall be subject to measures up to, and including, exclusion from school grounds.

The school or school districts will promptly and reasonably investigate of bullying or allegations The Building harassment. Principal or designee will be responsible for handling all complaints by students alleging bullying or harassment. The Superintendent or designee responsible

handling all complaints by employees alleging harassment.

It is also the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with investigator and principals, to develop procedures regarding policy. this The superintendent also is responsible for organizing training programs for students, school officials, faculty, staff and volunteers who have direct contact with students. The training will include how to recognize harassment and what to do in case a student is

harassed. It will also include proven effective harassment prevention strategies. The superintendent will also develop a process for evaluating the effectiveness of the policy in reducing bullying and harassment in the school district.

The board will annually publish this policy. The policy may be publicized by the following means:

- Inclusion in the student handbook
- Inclusion in the employee handbook

- Inclusion in the registration materials
- Inclusion on the school or school districts' web site,
- Inclusion in the school newsletter "INSIGHTS".

And a copy shall be made available to any person who requests it at the BCIG Central Administrative Office at 900 John Montgomery Drive, Ida Grove, Iowa.

# **Immunization Laws in Schools**

OA and BCIG School Districts new students and kindergarten students must submit a certificate of immunization against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, poliomyelitis, rubeola, rubella, and other immunizations required by law. The student may be admitted conditionally to the attendance center if the student has not yet completed the immunization process, but is in the process of doing so. Failure to meet the immunization requirement will be grounds for suspension, expulsion or denial of admission. Upon recommendation of the Iowa Department of Education and Iowa Department of Public Health, students entering the districts may for the first time be required to pass a TB test prior to admission. The districts may conduct TB tests of current students.

Exemptions from the immunization requirement will be allowed only for medical or religious reasons recognized under the law. The student must provide a valid Iowa State Department of Health Certificate of Immunization Exemption to be exempt from the policy.

# **Student Health and Immunization Certificates**

Series 500 Code 507.1

Students desiring to participate in athletic activities in the school district will have a physical examination by a licensed physician, nurse practitioner or physician's assistant and provide proof of such an examination to the school district.

Students enrolling for the first time in the school district will submit a certificate of immunization against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, poliomyelitis, rubeola, rubella, and other immunizations required by law. The student may be admitted conditionally to the attendance center if the student has not yet completed the immunization process but is in the process of doing so. Failure to meet the immunization requirement will be grounds for suspension, expulsion or denial of admission.

Exemptions from the immunization requirement in this policy will be allowed only for medical or religious reasons recognized under the law. The student must provide a valid Iowa State Department of Health Certificate of Immunization Exemption to be exempt from this policy.

# Student Athletes Health & Safety

All OA and BCIG students grades 7 through 12 desiring to participate in athletic activities in the school districts shall present the "Athletic Pre-Participation Physical Examination" certificate signed by a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, osteopath, advanced registered nurse practitioner (ARNP), physician's assistant or qualified doctor of chiropractic, to the effect that the student has been examined and may safely engage in athletic competition.

Additionally, all OA and BCIG students grades 7 through 12 desiring to participate in athletic activities in the school districts, along with their parent or guardian, must read the "Fact Sheet – Heads Up: Concussions in School Sports" and sign the acknowledgement page prior to beginning athletic practices or competitions.

Finally, the "Health and Injury Information Sheet and Consent for Medical Treatment" form must be completed and signed by the athlete's parent/guardian prior to beginning any athletic practices or competitions.

NOTE TO ALL STUDENT ATHLETES: DO NOT show up to practice without all three (3) of these documents completed, signed and turned in to the office of your building of attendance or your coach. The health and safety of our student athletes are of utmost importance to the Coaches, Sponsors and Administration of the OA and BCIG Community School Districts.

# School Fee Waivers

You do not have to complete the waiver to get free or reduced-price school meals for your children. You do have to sign the waiver if you wish to have book rent, music fees and/or driver's education fees reduced or waived. # **Student Lockers**
